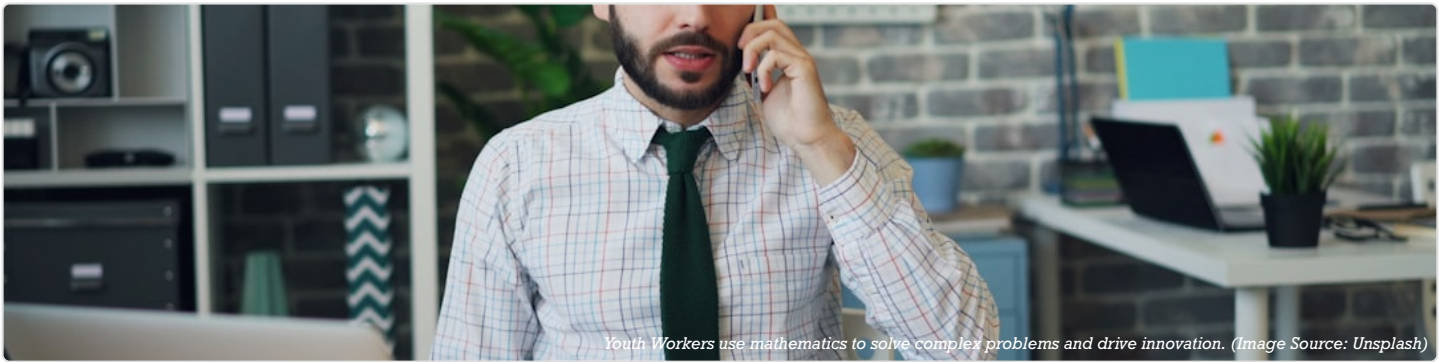


# CAREERS THROUGH MATHS: YOUTH WORKER

## JOB OVERVIEW

Youth Workers support young people's personal and social development, working in community centres, schools, and youth justice settings. They design and deliver programmes, provide guidance, and advocate for young people's needs. The role requires strong organisational and analytical skills to manage budgets, measure programme outcomes, and ensure efficient resource allocation.

Mathematical competence is essential for effective caseload management, funding applications, and demonstrating impact to stakeholders. Youth Workers use data to identify trends in youth needs, evaluate intervention success rates, and make evidence-based decisions about service delivery priorities.

SKILL	APPLICATION
<b>**Excel/Spreadsheets**</b>	Tracking budgets, monitoring attendance, and analysing programme data

<b>**Statistical Literacy**</b>	Interpreting evaluation data and calculating success metrics for funders

## TYPICAL PATHWAY

Most professional Youth Workers hold a degree or professional qualification in youth work, social sciences, or community development, validated by the National Youth Agency. Many enter through apprenticeships or foundation degrees, progressing to BA (Hons) Youth Work qualifications requiring 800+ practice hours. JNC (Joint Negotiating Committee) qualification is essential for local authority roles, with ongoing professional development through organisations like TAGYC.

## INDUSTRY DEMAND

Demand remains steady despite funding pressures, with particular need in youth justice, mental health support, and disadvantaged communities. The UK government's Youth Investment Fund has created new roles, while turnover maintains vacancies. Skills for Care data indicates over 7,000 youth workers in England alone, with growth in third-sector organisations delivering targeted interventions.

## REAL-WORLD IMPACT

Youth Workers directly improve young people's life chances by providing stable support systems and developmental opportunities. They reduce anti-social behaviour, improve educational outcomes, and support mental wellbeing. Their data-driven approach ensures resources reach those most in need, creating safer communities and developing future generations.
