Job Overview

A Theatre Nurse, also known as a Scrub Nurse, is a registered nurse who specialises in providing care to patients before, during, and after surgical procedures. They work within the sterile field of the operating theatre, assisting surgeons by anticipating instrument needs, managing surgical supplies, and monitoring the patient's condition. Their role is critical in maintaining aseptic technique and ensuring all equipment and counts are correct. The role demands meticulous attention to detail and the application of mathematical principles for calculating medication dosages, managing fluid balance, and coordinating complex surgical timelines. They work closely with anaesthetists, surgeons, and healthcare assistants in high-pressure environments where precision is paramount to patient outcomes.

Typical Pathway

The pathway begins with a Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC)-approved nursing degree (adult or paediatric branch) or a nursing degree apprenticeship. Following registration as a Registered Nurse (RN), gaining general experience is advised before specialising through a theatre nursing rotation or applying directly for a theatre post. Post-registration qualifications like the Specialist Practitioner Qualification (SPQ) in Perioperative Care are available for career advancement.

Industry Demand

Theatre Nurses are in consistently high demand across the UK's National Health Service (NHS) and private healthcare sectors. The NHS Long Term Plan emphasises increasing surgical activity to reduce waiting lists, ensuring ongoing need. The Royal College of Nursing reports specific shortages in specialist theatre roles, making this a secure career path with opportunities for progression into advanced practice roles.

Their precise calculations directly prevent medication errors, while their vigilant monitoring ensures early detection of complications.
